


2024 Annual Report




Volunteer Engagement

Trash Removal


16,727.5 pounds of debris removed from the environment.

Advocacy & Outreach



Ban the (Cigarette) Butt Success!

Save Our Shores, in collaboration with a local coalition, successfully advocated for the Ban the Butt initiative in Santa Cruz County. Save Our Shores' community science cleanup data was a major contributing factor to the success of this campaign. Cigarette filters, often the most common waste item in our cleanups, are made from harmful materials like microplastics, lead, and arsenic.

After a powerful outreach and advocacy campaign with broad community support, the Santa Cruz County Board of Supervisors unanimously passed the historic ordinance banning the sale of single-use cigarette filters in unincorporated areas. Santa Cruz County became the first in the nation to pass such an ordinance, and we hope it inspires other city jurisdictions and counties to follow suit.
